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COURTS THE PUBLIC AND THE LAW EXPLOSION, THE. Edited by Harry W. Jones. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall, Inc. 1965. Pp. vii, 177. \$3.95. An analysis, by seven of the nation's most distinguished experts in law and judicial administration, of the remedies available to reduce court workloads, expedite the decision of cases, and improve the process of judicial selection.

DISCRIMINATION AND THE LAW. Edited by Vern Countryman. Chicago: University of Chicago Press. 1965. Pp. xiv, 170. \$5.00. This volume is a compilation of papers given at a conference held at the University of Chicago Law School, sponsored by the School and the Anti-Defamation League. A thoroughgoing scrutiny is made of the achievements in due process of the law during the past ten years, in four basic areas—employment, education, public accommodation, and housing. The essential theme is the constitutional law of race discrimination. The writers weigh the relative merits of the exercise of legislative and judicial power, of government action, and private litigation.

WINDWARD OF THE LAW. By Rex Mackey. London: W.H. Allen. 1965. Pp. 192. \$25.00. A light-hearted work dedicated to dispelling any notions that Irish law might be dull. Frequent references are made to cases, both civil and criminal, by way of illustrating the author's point.
