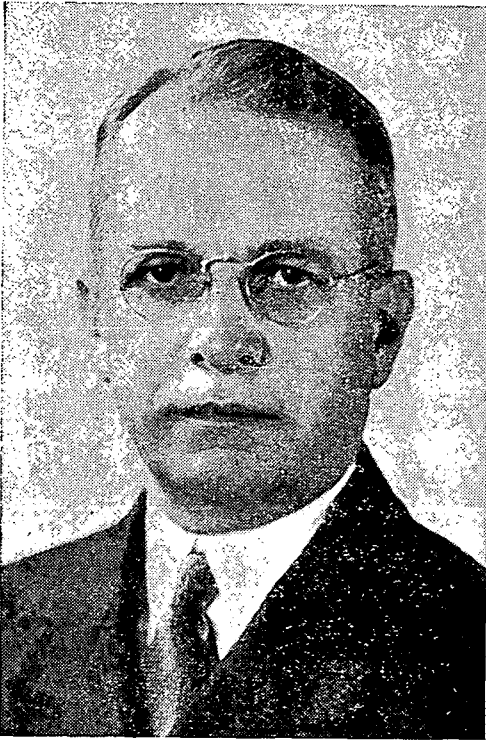

## BY THE INCOMING PRESIDENT

*To the Members of the Denver Bar Association:*

I have been requested to make a short statement with reference to the policies of the incoming Administration in conducting the affairs of the Denver Bar Association.

Thanks to the efforts of the retiring President, with the assistance of the other officers, the Committees, and the members, the Association at this time is more prosperous and active than at any other time in its history. It has been engaged, earnestly and seriously, in promoting the best interests of the legal profession, and incidentally of the public. Even in the lighter activities, such as the Medical-Legal Dinner and the Annual Outing, more of the members have attended, and there has been evident a greater degree of enthusiasm, geniality and good fellowship than ever before.
